### Dissertation Abstract: "Eudaimonism and Postmodern Identity"

The postmodern condition is marked by a proliferation of images, objects, and ideas, such that quantity seemingly erases quality, and shallowness replaces depth. Even still, I argue, the postmodern can support a

concept of identity grounded in a discreet, autonomous moral subject. I argue further that a moral subject can be constituted absent the quagmire of modernity's centered, reconciled self, which simultaneously eliminates what some postmodern theorists offer as alternative: a nihilistic acceptance of the discreet subject's dissolution into a fragmented, decentered self incapable of action. Moreover, rather than linking this change in subjectivity with the movements of capital, or the modernizing, alienating force of capitalism, I link modernity's identity quagmire to a shift in the definition of "justice" brought about by two hallmarks of modern philosophical thought: the birth of continental rationalism and the predominance of social contract theory. These theories claim that identity is internal, unified, and the basis of autonomy and agency, as well as necessary for political justice. However, justice under the social contract is tied to an accountability that requires more than one's own internal assessment of merit; it requires external, objective, or material kinds of evidence as well. This necessarily emphasizes the quantitative aspects of political justice, leaving behind the qualitative aspects favored by the ancients, who more routinely defined justice as consistency with a definitional state, or having to do with character. The relationship between the modern and the postmodern—in empirical, theoretical and historical terms—reveals a cyclicality in the external world that is analogous to the activity of identity formation. Postmodern identity, then, is an activity in which multiple, sometimes highly diverse, characteristics coalesce. This activity is not a means by which we reach a static point, but rather a continuous movement and an end in itself. Identity is the reconciler, not the reconciled. To better understand the possibilities for coherent postmodern subjectivity, this study bridges ancient and postmodern thought to reveal how identity should be understood as an activity that reconciles, rather than a thing or object reconciled.
